Maybe I can repurpose some of the clothes in my closet to create a new ensemble. Even if the judge can't taste my cake, I have expanded by cooking skills by making meals for my family.

I pledge my heart to greater loyalty... Regardless of the type of fair that will be held, 4-H members display strong personal values and concern for others. Many members and clubs have continued to show concern for their community and others. Letters have been written and phone calls made to shut ins and family members who are living by themselves. Our Twin Creeks District 4-H members continue to collect the fronts of greeting cards to be sent to the St. Jude's Ranch for Children. 4-H members are loyal to their communities.

I pledge my hands to larger service... Many community service projects have come to a halt due to COVID restrictions. This has not stopped our 4-H members from planning ahead for the time they can gather together once again to share and volunteer their skills to help others.

I pledge my health to better living... Stay home. Wash your hands. Wear masks for your protection as well as others to prevent the spread of disease. We are determined to have a stronger 4-H program after COVID-19 in realizing that meetings, project education and events can be conducted using alternative methods. We hope to grow and increase our capacity in serving audiences that we have not been able to reach.

To Make the Best Better... Our 4-H members are encouraged to do their best and improve the next time, so their "best" becomes "better". In this manner, members stretch their abilities and capacities to reach their full potential. As a 4-H Youth Development Extension Agent, I am tasked to create opportunities for youth to practice making their best better through programs and opportunities.

Needless to say, we ARE all in this together, and we WILL come out of it stronger than before. Activities and events may not look the same, but the focus has not changed. We are committed to providing a positive, dynamic learning experience for youth.

Take a few minutes and focus on the positive affects the COVID-19 pandemic has created for your family. These changes may become part of your new normal.
