Do you enjoy a good book? Do you like to read or study other project areas in 4-H? Check into the phases of the 4-H reading project. The reading project encourages you to harness your love of reading to learn more about your 4-H projects, research new topics, or entertain yourself. As Dr Seuss wrote "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn the more places you'll go." Get a library card for your local public library, share a book review with others, and read with younger kids at an elementary school, or with seniors at a long-term care facility.

Expanding Horizons Advanced

- Identify a discussion group (face-to-face, email, or website).
- Keep a record of books read and discussions attended.
- Keep a journal of reading reflections.
- Serve as a junior leader for younger members.
- Share books with groups outside of 4-H .
- Create a book bag for a church or daycare.

Inspire Kids to Do

Explore

"I might like to do this."

Youth who explore a variety of interests before high school, through experiences like 4-H camps and educational events, can develop early interest in a career path and improve their academic performance.

Learn

"I can do this."

4-H project-based learning, guided by adult volunteers, improves youth understanding of skills and concepts, as well as their ability to problemsolve and collaborate.

Practice

"I'm interested in this."

Youth who have participated in sustained hands-on learning and engaged with professional mentors and volunteers before entering high school are more likely to explore studies and potential career paths.

Experience

"I will be this."

Real-world application is key — 91% of Kansas 4-H members have a plan for reaching their goals. Youth that have been active participants in hands-on learning, combined with strong decision-making skills, are more able to effectively navigate life.

Expand Your Experiences!

Healthy Living

- Read books about healthy living, or how to plant your own vegetables.
- Read for enjoyment, to relax and be mentally balanced
- Learn to read recipes, and nutritional labels of foods.
- Participate in a story book walk.

Science and Agriculture

- Read books about science experiments, animal lives and space adventures.
- Visit a librarian and learn about library science.
- Subscribe to "Zoobooks" or other science and agriculture publications and magazines.

Community Vitality

- Volunteer at the local public library or help your school librarian with a project.
- Host a book fair or book drive and donate books to a library.
- Read the local newspaper to keep up with community events and activities.

Communication and the Arts

- Create a bookmark that shares the benefits of reading.
- Celebrate Dr. Seuss Day in your community and prepare activities for younger readers.
- Create a window display in a local business to share the importance of literacy.

- Explore majors in the fields of literature, creative writing, and literature with a teaching certificate: K-State's Department of English K-State's College of Education
- Explore career options in cultural studies.
- · Learn about library science.
- Tour your local library and visit with a librarian about their career.
