




Reading Challenge: Exploring Literary Genres



Reading provides many avenues for discovery and enjoyment. Many different types of books can be found in public and school libraries, bookstores, on-line and within reading apps. Webster Dictionary defines “genre” as a category of literary composition characterized by a particular style, form or content. Through this challenge, you will be encouraged to explore and discover the many genres of books that are available on bookshelves around the world. Your goal is to understand that genres can be a common language, connecting your literary voyage to someone else.

Inspire Kids to Do

Skill Building

- Seek out interesting books that you will enjoy reading. Explore the different literary genres.
- Learn how to use a library and its many services.

Goals

- Read and experience a wide variety of literary genres.
- Ask your school/public librarian to help find a new book genre.
- Explore a school/public library to learn where different genres are located.
- Complete a book scavenger hunt identifying titles of books from different genres.

Project Ideas

- Create an exhibit highlighting different genres you have read.
- Complete a book report from the nonfiction genre.
- Read an excerpt from a new genre at county/district 4-H Club Day.

- Start a book club discussion for teens at your library to introduce new genres to peers.
- Create an “Explore Literary Genres” challenge for youth.
- Host an “Explore Literary Genres” reading at your school/public library.
- Work with a school or public librarian to create a virtual tour of the library, highlighting various literary genres.



Genre Chart




Genre Definitions

1. **Nonfiction** or **Informational** texts present documented facts on any aspect of the physical, biological, or cultural world.
2. **Biographies, Autobiographies, and Memoirs** provide detailed descriptions of a *person's life*.
3. **Realistic Fiction** portrays stories that could occur to characters in a *believable setting*. Realistic fiction often discusses issues that children confront in their *everyday lives*.
4. **Historical Fiction** features *fictionalized accounts of actual historical figures, events, or places*.
5. **Traditional Literature** features stories (*myths, legends, folktales, fairy tales, etc.*) passed down to teach lessons and impart wisdom.
6. **Fantasy** features *magical and/or supernatural* elements as part of the plot, setting, or theme.
7. **Science Fiction** features *futuristic* elements that are within the realm of scientific probability and/or the laws of nature.
8. **Poetry** is the artistic expression of ideas and feelings through *carefully selected words* that may or may not be *rhythmical or rhyming*.
